

ORDINANCE No. 109.

A Bill for an ordinance in relation to the use and sale of Fire works in the City of Hopkins, Missouri,

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Hopkins as follows:-

Sec. 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to shoot or discharge any toy pistol, cane or devise using percussion caps, rocket, fire-cracker, torpede or other fireworks or dangerous combustible material in the city of Hopkins at any time, except any person may shoot, fire or discharge in said City limits fire-crackers of not over two (2) inches in length, roman candles, sparklers, spinning wheels and except that sky rockets may be fired on the premises of any person in said city with the consent of such person.

Sec. 2. It shall be unlawful for any person, merchant firm or corporation, to sell or expose for sale, in the City of Hopkins any of the fireworks prohibited by section one hereof, but they may sell or offer for sale fireworks mentioned in the exceptions in section One hereof.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall not apply to any ~~exhibition~~ <sup>exhibition</sup> of fire works given on any public holiday or public occasion by the citizens of said city, as a public entertainment, providing same be given from a raised stand or top of some building, not to any salute fired by any regularly organized organization or society.

Sec. 4. Any person, firm, merchant or corporation may sell fire works for the purposes mentioned in Section Three hereof.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall not apply to sale of arms or ammunition for sporting or blasting purposes.

Sec. 6. Any person found guilty of violating any of the provisins of this ordinance shall be fined in a sum not exceeding Fifty (50) Dollars.

Section 7. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 8. This ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage and approval.
