

There was Submitted an Ordinance to Levey the Taxes for General purposes and to pay the Waterworks bonds, and to pay indebtedness for electric lights for lighting said City of Hopkins.

Motion made and seconded, that this Ordinance be placed on its First reading, this motion prevailed, and it was read a First time as follows:-

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of said City of Hopkins, as follows:-

-: There is hereby levied for the year 1914, a tax of Twenty-Five Cents On the One Hundred Dollar's Valuation, on all taxable property in the City of Hopkins for General purpose, " And there is hereby, levied for the year 1914, a tax of Seventy-Five Cents, on the One Hundred Dollars, Valuation, on all taxable property in the City of Hopkins, for the purpose of paying the interest , and bonds, for building the City Water-works,- And there is here-by levied for the year 1914 a tax of Twenty-Five, Cents, on the Hundred Dollars, Valuation, on all taxable property, in the City of Hopkins for the purpose of paying for lighting the City of Hopkins.

-: This Ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its, passage and approval.

Motion made and second, that this Ordinance be read a second time, This motion prevailed and it was read a Seconded time:

Motion made and seconded, that this Ordinance be read a Third time and put upon its final passage, This motion prevailed and it was read a Third time;

Mayor Donlin, then put the question, " Shall this Ordinance be passed: and the vote was taken as follows:-

Mayor Donlin, then declared the Ordinance passed, and forthwith returned it with his approveal, endorsed thereon, and attested by the City Clerk, and Seal of said City affixed thereto, dated this the 8th day of June, 1914. and instructed the Clerk to place upon the City Records, a true copy; of said Ordinance, and it shall be known as Ordinance Number(65) and is found recorded on page, (15) of the City Records.

City Atourney, Browne, then submitted, A Bill for an Ordinance granting to H. A. Dalby, his successors, and assigns, an Electric light Franchise upon certain terms and conditions here-in provided.

Motion made and seconded, that this Ordinance, be placed on its First, reading, This motion prevailed, and it was read a First time.

Motion made and seconded, That further reading of this Ordinance be deferred, until the next meeting of the Board, or at such time, after Mr Dalby had been made acquainted, and accepted all provisions, there-in set-forth. This motion prevailed, when the board on motion did then adjourn, subject to the call of the Mayor.
