

## (ORDINANCE, NO (84))

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Hopkins, Missouri, as follows,-:

Section,-1. THE City of Hopkins is hereby devided into -Three-(3) Oiling Districts, to be numbered Oiling Districts,-One,-Two,-and Three, as follows.-

1. Oiling District No. One shall be composed of the following streets and Alleys, - vis.

Barnard Street, from the West side of Second Street to East side of 5th Street.

Third Street, from the South side of Morehouse Street, to Barnard Street.

Roseberry Street, from the Railroad to Fourth, Street.

Fourth Street, from the South side of Roseberry Street to the North side of Warren Street.

Warren Street, from Fourth Street to the Railroad.

Railroad Street, along the West side of Block, Twenty-Six-(26) from Warren Street, to Barnard Street,- and all Alleys between the streets above named.

2. Oiling District No Two,-Shall consist of all the Streets and alleys in that portion of the City of Hopkins lying North of the South side of Barnard Street, except the Streets and alleys included in said Oiling District No One.

3,-Oiling District No Three,(3) Shall consist of all the streets, and alleys in that portion of the City of Hopkins, lying North of the South side of Barnard Street, except the streets and allyes included in said oiling District No One.

Section,-Two, The Board of Aldermen of the City of Hopkins shall, by resolution, from time to time as it deems expedient, in each year hereafter, cause such portion of said oiling districts, as they deem expedient, to be oiled, and the costs thereof shall be levied and paid as hereafter provided, and provided that in no case shall the costs of such oiling, exceed Five (5) cents per front foot, per month, upon the property abutting upon the stree or alley or part thereof so oiled, and providing that the expence of oiling in each of said districte shall be kept and charged separately.

Section, Three,- The above work shall be done by said City and an accurate account of the costs thereof, in each district, shall be kept by said City.

Section, Four,- The costs of oiling said streets and allyes shall be provided for and defrayed by a special tax to be assessed, in favor of the City on the adjoining property fronting or bordering on the said streets where such oiling is done, in the proportion that the linear feet of each lot or parcel of ground fronting or bordering on the street so oiled bears to the total number of linear feet of all property chargeable with the special tax, aforesaid, in the territory embraced in the oiling district in which such oiling is done.

Section,-Five,- Within Ten,-(10) days after said oiling is done the Board of Aldermen shall make the special assessments hereinprovided for, and the same shall be levied against the property liable therefor, and shall be collected as a special tax, and special tax bills shall issue therefor, which shall be known as special assessment for oiling District No -1.-2.-or 3. as the case may be.

Evry such tax bill shall be and constitute a lien against the lot or parcel of ground described in the same, until the same is paid, the said tax bills shall be made by the street Commissioner, signed by the Mayor and attested by the City Clerk, dated the day of said levey, and shall be payable in the following manner, Said tax-bills shall be due and payable and it shall be the duty of the owner or owners, of the property described in such tax bills to pay the amount of such tax-bills to the City Collector of the City of Hopkins within Five, (5) days after the date of issue, and if not so paid shall bear interest at the rate of eight (8) per-cent per annum from the First day of May, in each year in which such tax-bills are issued, providing that in the year 1919. such tax-bills shall bear interest at the rate of eight,-(8) per cent per annum from date of issue if not paid when due as aforesaid. If such tax-bills are not paid when due, suit shall be brought by said City for the enforcement of such lein and the collection of such tax bill, according to law, in any Court of competent jurisdiction.

This Ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage, and approval.

Motion made and Seconded, That this Ordinance be read a second time, This motion prevailed, and it was read a second time.

Motion made and seconded, That this Ordinance, be read a third time, and put upon its final passage, This motion prevailed, and it was read a third time.

Mayor Donlin, then put the question - " Shall this Ordinance be passed, -and the names of the Aldermen was called as follows, -:

E. A. Miller, -Yea, -E. B. Pike, -Yea, -P. W. Shafer, -Yea, -Oliver. Lewis, was ~~absent~~ Noted absent.

Mayor Donlin then declared the Ordinance Passed, and forthwith returned it with his approval endorsed thereon, and the same attested by the City Clerk, and the Seal of said City thereto, dated this the 12th day of August, 1919. and ~~###~~ instructed the clerk to place upon the City Records a true copy of said Ordinance, and it shall be known as Ordinance NO, -(81) and is found recorded on page, (120)

~~There was~~ There was, offered and, A Resolution in regard to Oiling certain Streets, and was read by the City Attourney as follows, -

Be it resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Hopkins as follows, -:

First, - That the Board of Aldermen shall cause the Streets mentioned in oiling District No. 1. to be oiled.

Seconded, That said board of aldermen shall cause the following streets in Oiling District No Two. to be oiled, -to-wit, Morehouse Street from West side of Third street, to West side of Second Street; Second street from South side of Morehouse Street, to the South side of Caroline Street, : Caroline Street from West side of Second street to first street.

Third, -: That said Board of aldermen shall Cause the following street in oiling District, No. Three. - to be oil, -to-wit, Barnard Street from the East side of -Fifth Street, to a point One Hundred and Forty feet East of the East side of Ninth Street in said City.

On motion made and Seconded, That this resolution be adopted and made a mater of record, This motion prevailed, and the forgoing reolution was passed and approved this the 12th, day of August, 1919.

There was submitted A bill for an Ordinance in relation to the closing the streets and alleys in the City of Hopkins Missouri, while the same are being worked improved or oiled. When on motion made and second, that this Ordinance be placed upon it First reading, this motion prevailed and it was read as follows, -:

Be it ordained by the Board of aldermen, of the City of Hopkins, Missouri, as follows, -.

Section, -1. The Mayor or Street Commissioner of the City of Hopkins shall have the power and authority to close any street or streets, alleys, or alleys, or public place in the said City, while the same are being worked, improved or oiled, and until such work, improvement or oiled street or alley is in proper condition to be used, and shall put up signs or barricades, to warn persons to keep off of such closed streets, allves or public places.

Section, -2. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons, to go or walk, or ride or drive, any horse or other animal, or any vehicle of any kind upon any such closed street, alley, or public place, while the same is closed, or to remove any sign or barricade from such closed street, alley, or public place.

Section, -3. The provisions of this Ordinance shall not apply to the persons working on such work, improvment, or oiling, and the side-walks along such closed streets may be used by padestrians, except where specially closed.

Section, -4. Any person who shall violate any provision of this Ordinance shall be ~~###~~ guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction shall be fined in a sum not exceeding Fifty, (50) Dollars.

This Ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage and approval.

Motion made, and seconded that this Ordinance be read a second time, this motion prevailed and it was read a second time.

Motion made and seconded, That this ordinance be read a third time, and put upon it final passage, This motion prevailed, and it was read a third time.
